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## NOW . . . RUSSIAN ROULETTE!

JUST ABOUT a year ago, we were wondering what our fate would be in the European Cup. Twice Liverpool had claimed the trophy in successive years, but as we began our bid to make it a hat-trick, the first-round draw decreed that we should meet Nottingham Forest, who had succeeded us as League champions.

September 13, 1978, proved unlucky for Liverpool, because on that night we came to grief against Forest. They were at home in the first leg, and with the score 1-0 for them, things were not looking too bad for Liverpool. However, in the closing stages, Forest scored again, and the damage was done.

The return game was hard for both teams, but after 90 minutes here Forest had held out for a no-score draw, and that meant our exit from the European Cup. Seldom have I been so disappointed since I joined Liverpool.

Even before a ball had been kicked, people were saying that whichever of us—Liverpool or Forest—won that tie, it would be the springboard to eventual success. And, indeed, Forest went all the way, to claim the trophy.

Now it's another European Cup campaign, and again Liverpool and Forest are throwing their hats into the ring. Again, too, many people are tipping one or other of us to regain or retain the trophy.

### BOB PAISLEY'S viewpoint

But at this stage, count me out of the forecasting.

Tonight, we meet a Russian team for the first time in Europe, and Dinamo Tbilisi will give us something to think about, here and on their own ground. I would be less than honest if I said I viewed tonight's challenge as being more difficult than the one which came from Forest last season—they don't and they won't come any harder than that test. But it will still be difficult, make no mistake.

Frankly, I would have liked an easier start to another European Cup campaign. When we met Forest, it was a case of two teams knowing everything about each other; tonight, it's a case of two teams coming up against the unknown, for while we have watched each other in action, we still have to put our theories to the test. So we're playing what you might call Russian roulette!

The Russians, who are well into their season, will be at peak fitness, because they have got their "second wind". They're disciplined, and they'll take some breaking down. Yet our job is to break them down and get goals. Quite simply, we hope to get enough to see us through the two legs . . . and if we do, we'll worry about a return match with Forest if and when we come to it.

## The chairman says . . .

## SOCCER IS No. 1 FOR SPECTATORS IN THE SOVIET UNION

WELCOME to the players and officials of Dinamo Tbilisi . . . and may I say that we are particularly pleased to be playing against the champion club of Russia for the first time in our 16 seasons of European competition, not least because in the Soviet Union, Soccer has the greatest spectator interest of all the major sports.

Indeed, I understand that the game got under way in Russia during the 1890's partly as a result of the great success of cycling as a sport around that time — Soccer matches were played in the interval between cycling events. And let me add that the British influence was evident.

British residents in Russia during that era were mainly businessmen who owned factories and mills, or who were in the Diplomatic Corps, and the British influence lasted until around 1908, by which time Russian football clubs had become numerous.

It was in 1975 that a Russian club—Dinamo Kiev—first carried off one of the major European trophies by beating Ferencvaros 3-0 in the final of the Cup-winners Cup, and now Dinamo Tbilisi, who have also competed in Europe before, get a taste of the European Cup.

We know there will be tremendous interest in our tie in Russia at all levels—the Soviet ambassador has been invited to the game here tonight—and I am confident it will be played in true sporting spirit.

As we welcome not only the members of the Dinamo Tbilisi party, and the match officials, let me just remind you that a U.E.F.A. delegate will also be in attendance. He is Mr. Nicolai Johansen, Secretary of the Norwegian Football Association, and in extending a welcome to him, also, I would like to emphasise that we are anxious to uphold the reputation of our own great club.

I am confident I can rely on our supporters to do this in every way—it includes making sure there is no encroachment on the pitch at ANY time.

# THE GAME-BY-GAME STATISTICS OF LIVERPOOL'S EUROPEAN RECORD

THE START of Liverpool's 16th consecutive season in Europe is also a special occasion, since tonight, for the first time, we play host to a team from Russia. Liverpool have played more than 100 games in European competition, but in all the time since we went into the European Cup on August 17, 1964, we have never been paired with a club from the Soviet Union.

Iceland was the starting point of our European safari; and we have met rivals from Belgium, East and West Germany, Italy, Hungary, Rumania, Holland,

Sweden, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland, Greece, Luxembourg, Yugoslavia, Norway, Poland, Turkey, France, Scotland, Ireland and our own English League.

Tonight we welcome to Anfield Dinamo from Tbilisi, the capital of Georgia, in the Russian Caucasus, and this makes the occasion unique. There is the added sense of excitement, also, as Liverpool make their bid to reclaim the European Cup and join the ranks of those who have captured the trophy three times. ## THE 'SILVER'

THE CLUBS which go forward to the final of the European Cup next spring will be taking part in a special "silver" anniversary occasion—for it will be the 25th final of the champions' club competition.

The first final was staged away back in 1956, and at that time the European Cup still had to find favour with many people in these islands. But as the tournament progressed, year by year, British clubs became drawn towards it like a magnet, and the time came when the European Cup was no longer a preserve of the Continental clubs.

Five times on the trot the great Real Madrid side which boasted such stars as Di Stefano, Puskas and Gento triumphed, from 1956 to 1960, despite the best efforts of teams from France, Italy and West Germany to halt them.

## Next final will be the 25th in the history of the European Cup

Finally, it was a Portuguese club, Benfica—the Eagles of Lisbon—who put an end to Real's monopoly of the competition, as they captured the European Cup in 1961 and 1962.

Then followed three years of Italian domination, as A.C. Milan and Inter-Milan (twice) scored successes, but in 1966—the year that England won the World Cup—Real Madrid emerged as winners of the European Cup for a sixth time.

However, this was not destined to be the start of a new reign of supremacy by the aristocrats of Spanish Soccer, for in 1967 a British club—Glasgow Celtic—made history by defeating Inter-Milan in the final which was staged in Lisbon, and Jock Stein and his players were followed by Matt Busby and the men of Manchester United, who at Wembley in 1968 took Benfica apart.

United were succeeded as holders by A.C. Milan, and then came the era when

## ANNIVERSARY

Dutch clubs took over, for after Feyenoord had beaten Celtic in the 1970 final, Ajax made it a hat-trick of successes on the trot. It was the start of a golden age for Holland which saw players such as Johan Cruyff, Johnny Rep and Johan Neeskens emerge as world-famous names.

Ajax had their day, and the end of it saw West Germany reigning, with Bayern Munich claiming the European Cup three times in succession, and we talked about the skills of players like Franz Beckenbauer.

But by the time the 1970's were coming to an end, the name of another club and its players—Liverpool—was on everyone's lips, as the men from Anfield went to Rome and outshone Borussia Moenchengladbach and, 12 months later, outplayed F.C. Bruges in the final at Wembley.

Liverpool were going for a hat-trick of triumphs in the competition when they had the bad fortune to be drawn against Nottingham Forest in the very first round last season, and it was generally considered that the winners would go on to carry off the trophy.

Forest won the tie in the first leg on their own ground, and defied all our efforts to overcome them at Anfield, and they went on to reach the final and

score a 1-0 victory over the Swedish team from Malmo.

Now Forest, as the holders, are trying their luck again—and Liverpool, having recaptured their League crown, are aiming for a third success in the glamour competition of European club football.

On the following pages, to set the scene as we take on Dinamo Tbilisi at Anfield tonight, is the list of winners and finalists since the European Cup competition first began, almost 25 years ago . . . and pictures which illustrate the feats of some of the great clubs which became giants of this glamour tournament.

## They're used to big crowds

DINAMO TBILISI are accustomed to playing in front of big crowds, not least in European football. Almost 800,000 fans have seen them in their 22 ties to date. Their own stadium will accommodate 100,000 people, and they had a capacity crowd when they played Cardiff City there in the Cup-winners Cup in September, 1976.

Their first European game, against Twente Enschede, in September, 1972, drew only 25,000 fans, and there was a gate of 17,000 for the return match in Holland. But the crowd had almost doubled when Dinamo met Slavia Sofia in the U.E.F.A. Cup in 1973, and there was a 50,000 gate when Spurs played in Russia.

The game against M.T.K. Budapest attracted 60,000 fans, and there were 80,000 spectators when Dinamo took on Inter-Milan. Dinamo drew 50,000 for the visit of K.B. Copenhagen, and gates of 80,000 when Zurich Grasshoppers and Hertha Berlin played in Russia, while the return match against Napoli in Italy attracted 62,000 people.

## EIGHT DRAWS . . . THEN NO POINTS!

THERE ARE 16 clubs in the First Division of Russian football—and it pays to go out for victory. As in this country, when a team draws a game, it picks up one point . . . but after eight drawn matches, no more points are awarded. So Moscow Torpedo, who drew 11 matches last season, "lost" three points.

The Russian football season begins towards the end of March and finishes around mid-November, and last season Dinamo Tbilisi headed the final table, with a four-point lead over their closest rivals, Dinamo Kiev (who, with nine matches drawn, "lost" a point).

Here, we give the final table for last season, showing the number of games each

HAVING WON the Cup, Dinamo Tbilisi are making a bold bid to retain their League title by keeping ahead of Dinamo Kiev and their Moscow rivals, and overtaking Schachtjor Donetsk, who finished in third place last season. After 18 matches, Dinamo and Schachtjor were level at the top, with 27 points.

Dinamo then had won 10 games and lost only one, and had scored 27 goals and conceded 10, while the challengers from Kiev and Moscow were two or three points adrift. Usually, Dinamo Tbilisi play in a 4-3-3 formation, though whether they switch to 4-4-2 for tonight's test against Liverpool remains to be seen.

Two of their players—David Kipiani and Manutchar Machaidze—were in the Dinamo side which played in the club's first European tie, against Twente Enschede seven years ago, and most of their other players have considerable experience in European competition and at international level.

Indeed, Dinamo can boast seven current internationals, and one of them, Ramaz Shengeliya, was a marksman in each of the five games he played for Russia between March and May this year.

Dinamo's most experienced player is their captain, Machaidze, who is 30 years old and belies his age by proving

THE COACH of Dinamo Tbilisi is Nodar Achalkazi an engineer who is in his mid-forties and who was born in Georgia. He formerly played for Moscow Lokomotiv and for the club he now manages. He took charge of the Dinamo club in the early days of 1976, as successor to Alexis Kotrikadze and his assistant, Boris Paichadze. The current Dinamo coach has two assistants, Slava Metreveli and Sergei Kutivadze.

not only that he can keep up with younger team-mates in training, but that he is consistent in terms of appearances.

Despite having been injured at times, he has not missed a League match during the past three seasons. He is one of Dinamo's international stars, and he operates in a midfield role, setting an example by his tireless running and his contribution to the team effort.

Dinamo have two goalkeepers, but the regular first-team choice is David Gogiya a 31-year-old whose brilliance and superb reflex actions have saved his side on several occasions. The reserve 'keeper, Otar Gabeliya, is 26 and has not had a great deal of League experience, due to Gogiya's consistency.

Dinamo have half a dozen players available for the back-four line, and they include two brothers, Shota Khinchagashvili, aged 28, and Nodar, who is 26 years old. Shota Khinchagashvili, although not currently playing in his country's team, is a Russian international, and he has switched from playing at full-back to the middle of the back-four line.

Reliable, and a good organiser in defence, he possesses a considerable turn of speed, is difficult to beat in a one-against-one situation, and has good positional sense . . . all of which makes him a dependable, rock-like barrier at the heart of the defence.

It took Piruz Kanteladze some time to establish himself as a first-team regular

ava, who has been a member of Dinamo's "international set" this term, was out of action for four months last year after receiving a severe injury, but he finally regained a place in the first team when first one, then another player dropped out through injury. One of them was a 20-year-old, **Boris Ruchadze**, who is regarded as one of the up-and-coming players at Dinamo.

The chances are that **Gocha Machaidze** will be playing at left-back, although he broke through to first-team football as a midfield player. Aged 29, Machaidze was switched to the No. 3 spot as an experiment, and it worked out well.

Another defender is 23-year-old **Dimi-tri Mudzhiri**, who is a very strong player, physically, while **Aleksander Chivadze**, who is 24 years old, has shown that he can adapt equally well when called upon to switch from midfield to a defensive role.

During the second half of last season he played alongside Kanteladze in the middle of the back-four line. Chivadze is noted for his ability to read situations, and for the precision of his passing. And he can go up in support of attacks.

In midfield, Dinamo are likely to have **Vakhtang Koridze** and **Vitalii Daraseliya**, though **Vakhtang Kopaleishvili**, a 25-year-old, could also be in the running for a place. Koridze, aged 30, is equally strong whether it's defending or reinforcing the attack, and he packs a powerful shot, as he demonstrated

when scoring eight goals last season.

Daraseliya, who is still only 22 years old, missed the first half of last season, but when he returned to the side Dinamo benefitted from his clever passing which produced a fair quota of goals—in fact, Daraseliya himself knocked in five, and two of those goals proved to be match-winners. Like Koridze, Daraseliya is a current international.

When it comes to the front line, in **David Kipiani** Dinamo have a forward who won the vote as the best player in Russia in 1977, and this 28-year-old danger-man is another of the club's current internationals.

Kipiani can play as a front runner, but he also sometimes operates from a deep position, and in Russia his reputation is such that he is often accorded the "privilege" of being given a personal marker.

Yet another international is 27-year-old forward **Vladimir Gutsaev**, whose strong points are speed and a deceptive body swerve. He can make dangerous bursts down the flank and cause trouble

with his pin-point crosses, and last season was one of the best in his career—a factor which brought him to the attention of the international team selectors.

Twenty-four-year-old **Revaz Chelebadze** proved to be a useful stand-by for a place in the front line last season, but undoubtedly one of the big names in attack, along with Kipiani, is **Ramaz Shengeliya**, who—at 22—is a regular in club and international level.

With Daraseliya and Koridze, he played in all five of Russia's matches between March and May, and last season he finished as Dinamo's leading marksman, with 15 goals.

Shengeliya has plenty of natural ability, and an instinct for being on the right spot at the right time; but he has also worked hard to perfect his game.

His reward for all this was to be named Russia's Footballer of the Year last season . . . which was also memorable for aggregate attendances at home League attained the "magic million" mark in aggregate attendances at home League matches for the first time in their history, and the average gate of something like 68,500 was remarkable, by any standards.

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DINAMO TBILISI, the club from the city which is the capital of Georgia, and which lies in the valley of the River Kura, in the Caucasus, have a distinguished record in Russian Soccer, and they have gained a fair amount of experience on the European circuit.

Founded in 1924, Dinamo—whose normal colours are white shirts (blue collar and blue edging at the end of the sleeve), blue shorts and blue stockings—proudly display the letter "D" in blue on their team jersey, and with good reason.

Dinamo claimed the Russian League championship in 1964 (although they didn't compete in the European Cup the following season, since Russia had no entry in the tournament), have been runners-up in their premier division four times, and claimed the title again at the end of last season.

Dinamo, indeed, who came second in 1939, 1940, 1951 and 1953, have finished in the lower half of the table on only two occasions since their league came into existence in 1936. Once was in 1955, the other time in 1958; and on each occasion they finished ninth.

They have had mixed fortunes when it comes to Cup finals, for five times they suffered defeat before claiming the trophy in 1976. Forty years previously, they reached the final and went down 2-0 against Lokomotiv Moscow; in 1937 they met Moscow Dynamo and lost 5-2; nine years later they tried their

luck against Moscow Spartak and finished on the wrong end of a 3-2 score-line; in 1960 Moscow Torpedo scored a 4-3 victory over them; and in 1970 it was Moscow Dynamo who beat them, 2-1.

However, they made it a decisive success when, in September, 1976, they took their domestic Cup by beating Ararat 3-0, and this season they have already won the trophy again.

Dinamo won through to the quarter-finals and a tie against Krylja Sovjetov Kuibyshev (Wings of the Soviet) and scored a 2-0 victory; and in their semi-final tie against Z.S.K.A. Moscow, Dinamo came from behind to win 2-1, after extra time. That brought them up against Moscow Dynamo, and the men from Georgia ran out 5-4 winners . . . on penalties.

LIVERPOOL'S trip to Russia next month will be an adventure, because we have never travelled to the Soviet Union for a European tie before, and for our supporters who will be making the journey by Russian jet, here is some "tourist" information in advance.

Tbilisi is the capital of Georgia (the name was changed from Tiflis in 1936) and the state itself has a population of 5,000,000 people, while Tbilisi boasts a population of more than 900,000 people.

The locals are keen on their football, and there are two grounds which are available for big matches. Dinamo Tbilisi can use a giant stadium which will accommodate around 100,000 spectators, but they also sometimes play in the Lokomotiv stadium, which has accommodation for about 40,000 people.

For Liverpool and their supporters, the journey will be a long haul—but, clearly, an interesting one. The supporters' flight will go from Liverpool, touch down at Kiev for refuelling, and then travel on to Tbilisi . . . total distance, something like 4,000 miles.

Although this is Liverpool's first encounter with a team from Russia in European competition, Dinamo Tbilisi are no strangers to this country, since they visited England on football business almost 20 years ago. Then, they met three clubs—Tottenham Hotspur, Sheffield Wednesday and Wolves — and

finished up with two defeats (against Spurs and Wednesday) and a draw.

The kick-off time for the return game in Georgia is expected to be 5.30 p.m. (local time) which means it will be 7.30 p.m. G.M.T.

Having won their League championship last season by finishing ahead of their closest rivals, Dinamo Kiev—four points separated the clubs — Dinamo Tbilisi are making a bold bid to carry off the title again, and between tonight's match and the return game, they have two League fixtures—against Krylja Sovjetov Kuibyshev (home) next Sunday, and against Kairat Alma-Ata (away) on Friday, September 28.

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## **AND A PERSONAL POINT OF VIEW . . . from TOM SAUNDERS**

LIVERPOOL'S Youth Development Officer, Tom Saunders, has been "Our Man in Russia" at times during recent weeks, for he has taken the opportunity to check on Dinamo Tbilisi in action both on their own, 100,000-capacity ground in Georgia and away from home when they met Moscow Torpedo in the League (and drew, 1-1) and Moscow Dynamo in the Cup final (Tbilisi won 5-4 on penalties).

Tom says: "Dinamo Tbilisi are a disciplined team, in the pattern of German sides—especially the East German sides such as Dynamo Dresden—and they are really well-organised in defence. If they lose possession, they make sure they get men behind the ball, and they give nothing away at the back".

Tom saw Tbilisi playing in the Lenin stadium in Moscow—an Olympic stadium which has a running track and which can accommodate 115,000 spectators. The day of the Cup final there were 75,000 fans and, says Tom, "the atmos-

phere was a bit artificial, because the crowd seemed to be a long way from the pitch.

"But from what I saw and heard, the Tbilisi fans seem to support their team fanatically, and a 100,000 sell-out seems certain when we play in Georgia. Dinamo's ground there is rated one of the finest in Russia . . . it's a new stadium, built about 1970.

"I got the impression that Dinamo weren't exactly relishing their visit to Anfield, but they were certain they would more than hold their own in the return game. Tbilisi have emerged in the past two seasons as THE team in Russia—and remember, there are five crack teams in Moscow. They've also overtaken Dinamo Kiev as Russia's No. 1 side. Apparently the rivalry between the 'state' teams and those from Moscow is quite something." And the same goes for tonight's game, as Liverpool battle to take a substantial lead for the return in Russia.





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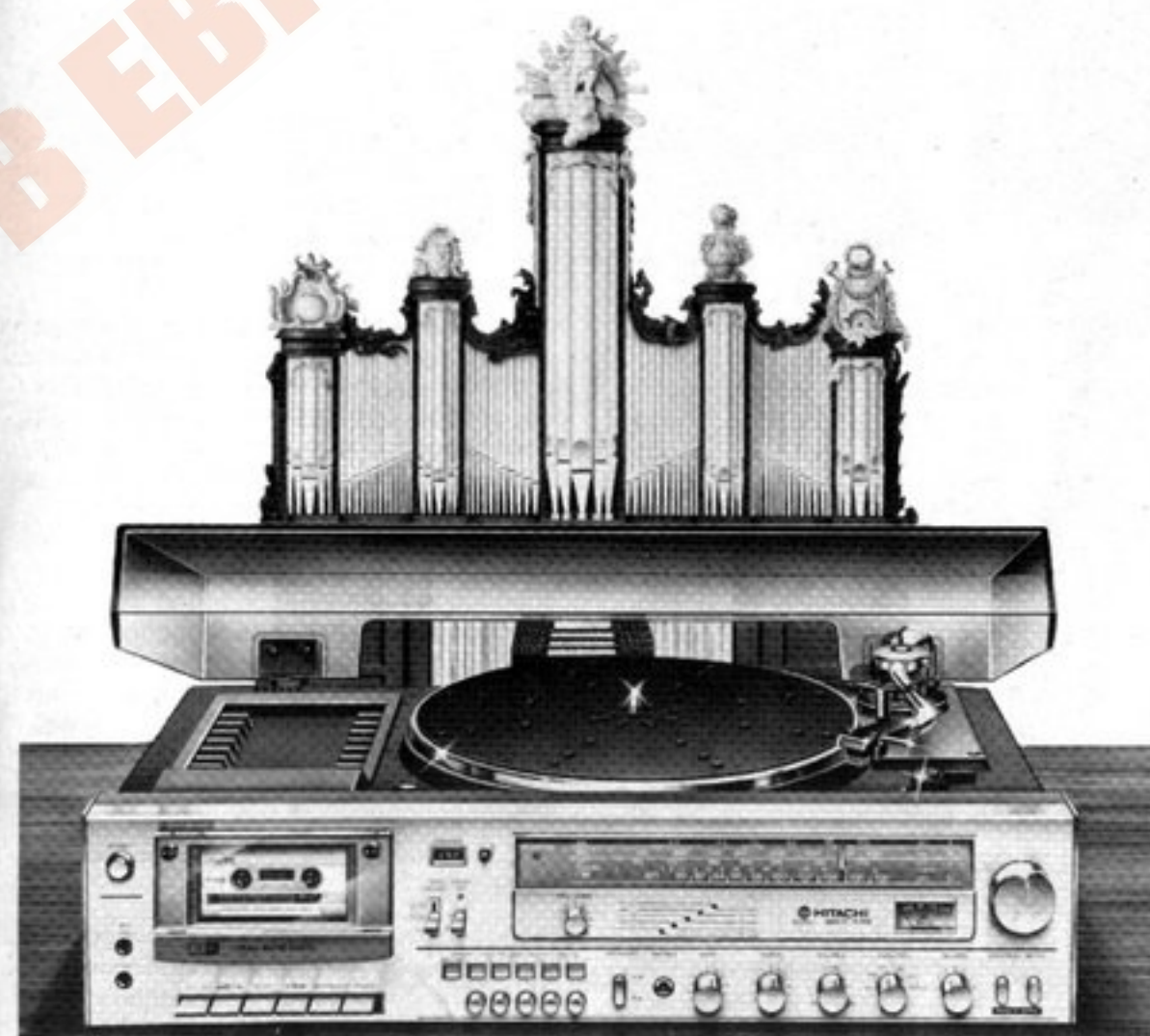
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# THE RECORD BREAKERS

## THE £100,000 TEENAGER WHO BECAME A HAT-TRICK HERO



THE first player to score a goal for Liverpool in European football was Roger Hunt—and he hit two goals, as did Gordon Wallace, when we went to Iceland in 1964 and beat Reykjavik 5-0 as we tested the temperature in the European Cup. Phil Chisnall was our other marksman.

As the European matches went by, Ian St. John, Gerry Byrne, Willie Stevenson, Bobby Graham, Ron Yeats, Ian Callaghan, Chris Lawler, Geoff. Strong, Peter Thompson, Tommy Smith, Tony Hateley, Emlyn Hughes and Alec Lindsay got their names on the scoresheet.

Liverpool played in the European Cup in season 1964-65, then the Cup-winners Cup, the European Cup again, and the Fairs Cup . . . and it was in season 1969-70 that another player became a marksman in Europe—Alun Evans.

The flaxen-haired player had already hit the headlines when, in 1968, he left Wolves for Liverpool, because he was tagged the first £100,000 teenager. It was a label he was stuck with, as he settled into the side, and Liverpool kept on

competing in Europe.

On September 16, 1969—almost exactly 10 years ago—Liverpool set another club record as they hammered League of Ireland side Dundalk 10-0 in the first round of the Fairs Cup. Up to then, our highest victory had been an 8-0 thrashing of Munich 1860.

Liverpool ran riot here against Dundalk, with goals from Lawler, Callaghan, Lindsay and Thompson, and a brace apiece from Smith, Graham and Evans. After Dundalk, it was Vitoria Setubal, and one of the most dramatic endings to a European night at Anfield.

Setubal won the first leg in Portugal by the only goal; and it was a battle royal when they came to Anfield on November 16, 1969. Evans, Hunt and Smith were Liverpool's scoring heroes, and the fans roared their delight at a 3-2 victory.

But even as they thought Liverpool had done enough to force a play-off, the night air was chilled by the announcement: "Setubal go through to the next round, on the ruling that with the aggregate score level, away goals count double." So it was exit Liverpool.

The following season, however, we

were back in the Fairs Cup, and after disposing of Ferencvaros, Dinamo Bucharest and Hibernian, we met Bayern Munich at Anfield. Everyone expected a tense struggle . . . but on the night, Alun Evans scored a personal triumph.

Once, twice, three times he shattered Bayern—and in doing so, became the first Liverpool player to notch a hat-trick on the European circuit. Liverpool 3, Bayern 0 was the scoreline. An Ian Ross goal gave us a 1-1 draw in the return, so Liverpool were through to the semi-finals.

Unhappily, Leeds United came to Anfield, went home with a single-goal lead; and though Liverpool did everything but score in the return, a 0-0 result put these into the final.



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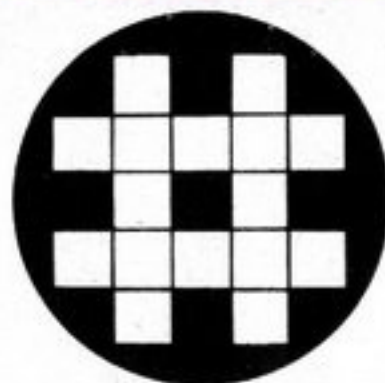
